## Major Changes to OSAP and E.I

Going back to school once you've entered the worforce can be a daunting task. However with recent changes to OSAP and E.I, it may just be getting a little bit easier.



This is a three year pilot project which means that if you've been considering going back to school, now might be the time to consider it in more detail, as after the pilot project is over, there is no guarantee that it will continue.

Some of the quick facts of the annoucement are as follows:

"The pilot project top-up grant funding will be prorated based on the length of the study period. For example, those registered for an eight-month school year will receive \$1,600, while those registered for a 12-month school year will receive \$2,400. This funding will be provided on top of any other grants the student qualifies for.

Using a working or newly unemployed Canadian's current income rather than the previous year's earnings means they could become eligible for income-tested Canada Student Grants, including up to \$3,000 for the Canada Student Grant for Full-time Students as well as the top-up funding.


The top-up funding is available to full-time students pursuing an undergraduate degree, certificate or diploma of at least two years in duration at a designated post-secondary institution who have been out of high school for at least 10 years.

Support is also coming this fall for Canadians who find themselves out of work and want to go back to school. Today, if an unemployed worker is receiving Employment Insurance (EI) benefits, they may lose their eligibility for those benefits if they return to school or undertake training, which interferes with their availability for work, without the necessary referral from designated authorities. Starting in fall 2018, an unemployed person will be able to go back to school to get the training they need to find a new job—without fear of losing the EI benefits she needs to pay rent and buy groceries" (Employment and Social Development Canada)

With the reduction in hours many entry level workers are facing due to Bill 148, now may be the time to seize the day and increase the education they have to gain a higher skill set, higher pay position, by gaining a post-secondary education.
