On March 24th, 2011 Confederation College signed an agreement with Waaskiinaysay Ziibi Inc. (WZI) as the training service provider to deliver a historical initiative referred to as the Little Jackfish Pre-employment Training Program.

WZI, with Confederation College as a partner, submitted a proposal for pre-employment training to the Northern Training Partnership Fund. This fund was created by the Province of Ontario, administered by the Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities, in September 2010. Prior to the 2010 year end, WZI received approval of their submission.

WHAT IS WZI?

WZI is a development corporation wholly owned by five First Nation communities surrounding Lake Nipigon, including Whitesand, Lake Helen (Red Rock Indian Band), Animibiigoo Zaagi'igan Anishinaabek (AZA), Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek (BZA), and Bingwi Neyaashi Anishinabek (BNA). Their goal is to prepare their community for employment opportunities during the construction of the Little Jackfish Hydro Electric Project.

LITTLE JACKFISH PRE-EMPLOYMENT TRAINING PROGRAM

The Little Jackfish pre-employment training program is an opportunity that comes around once in a lifetime. It is a multi-year, multi-faceted pre-employment training program to increase the literacy skills, workplace essential skills, and life skills prior to individuals pursuing opportunities in the skilled trades related to construction.

Individuals seeking to benefit from this training initiative participate in an intake and assessment process which establishes a starting point based on their personal career goals. The next step on the pathway to entering the skills training opportunities is pre-employment training. Pre-employment training classrooms are set up in Whitesand, BZA, Lake Helen, Thunder Bay, the Confederation College Greenstone Campus in Geraldton and, very shortly, in Beardmore.

TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

The training opportunities that follow pre-employment training include trades preparation courses such as Construction Techniques. This is a one-year Ontario College Certificate program designed as an introduction to the employment realities of working in the trades.

CofQ PREPARATION PROGRAM

The Certificate of Qualification or CofQ Preparation Program allows Aboriginal people who have worked in the Carpentry trade, to prepare and challenge the provincial qualification exam. A provincial CofQ and inter-provincial or "Red-Seal" certificate will be granted to those scoring over 70%. Entry into this program is based on prior approval of the required 7200 hours experience by the Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities.

SKILLED TRADES

Trades training combines classroom theory with practical training using the equipment and tools specific to a particular profession. Through this program participants may have an opportunity to enter a trade as an apprentice. Some of the trades in this initiative include Cook, Electrician, General Carpenter, Heavy Equipment Operator, Millwright, and Plumber.

CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT TRAINING

Construction Support Training is for those individuals interested in non trade's related training. This includes such possibilities as Security Guard and Office Administration which consists of up to six months of in-school training followed by on-the-job training.

As a member of one of the WZI communities, you are eligible to participate in this exciting opportunity.

The training Initiative has a Coordinator located at the WZI office in Lake Helen. (Milton Wawia.)

Each community has a Retention Support Worker that also helps individuals get involved. They are: Hope Tibishkogijig – Whitesand, Line Clarke – BNA, Dorothy Cheesequay – AZA, Monique Becker – BZA, and Marilyn Michelle – RRIB. Each of the Retention Support Workers can be contacted at the Community Band Office.
